Startvac

Startvac mastitis vaccine has been available in New Zealand for 4 years now and is slowly gaining a foothold in the dairy industry. It is used to protect against E.coli and Staph aureus infections as well as having general efficacy against gram negative pathogens and CNS infections. Numerous studies have shown positive effects of introducing a Startvac vaccination protocol into troublesome herds.

Key findings from studies are that the reproduction ratio of CNS reduced by 35% and Staph aureus by 45%. In both cases the reproduction ratio is reduced below 1 so that in theory Staph aureus would eventually fade out in vaccinated herds. In reality it highlights how vaccination is only one tool in the fight against mastitis and how there cannot be any let off in traditional methods of control.

Vaccination response was greater in young first calving heifers compared to MA cows, highlighting that once the damage is done it is more difficult to repair.

The Irish paper (which is more relevant to NZ conditions) showed increased cure rates, and reduced infections in first calving cows, increased milk production from vaccinated cows and a massive drop in cell count from 236,000 to 195,000.

Milk production and cure rate at lactation, in heifers and at dry-off, cure rate at lactation, in heifers and at dry-off, increased after vaccination. New infections decreased after vaccination and cure rate in heifers and at dry-off improved.

Finally, New Zealand work showed a reduction in BSSC between seasons in herds using Startvac.

Pasteurisers

Agilis has just received their latest shipment of colostrum pasteurisers. Coming from Dairy Tech Inc out of Colorado in the USA these precision Low temperature Heat Treatment units were very popular last year.

The benefits of heat treating your colostrum mean diseases are less likely to be transmitted to young calves as pathogens are killed in the process and the transfer of all-important immunoglobulins to the new-born calf is greatly improved. This leads to healthier calves through the rearing process flowing on to healthier heifers entering the herd. The heat-treating process is carefully controlled to ensure the temperature of colostrum reaches but does not exceed 60 degrees centigrade. The 60 degrees is critical as any higher and the all-important immunoglobulins will be destroyed and any lower and pathogens will persevere.

REMEMBER: 60 degrees for 60 minutes!

The common theme from last year's installations is that calves have never been healthier and those that have gone with this technology would not go back.
